One of my favorite hymns in our hymnal is "In the Bulb There Is a Flower" (#250). We sang it in worship on March 23, and you can hear it starting at 5:15 in that Sunday's worship podcast. With its imagery of nature stirring to life after winter, the hymn reminds us that even in seasons of waiting, there is hope, growth, and possibility; evidence that God is already at work, whether or not we can see the results yet. I've been known to blast that hymn in the car in the middle of winter, willing it to be spring. But it feels fitting now too, as new life begins to emerge all around us.

Rachel and I have a small garden plot at County Farm Park, and this time of year is full of eager (sometimes over-eager) anticipation, planting seeds and seedlings, crowding them a little too close together because we can't wait to see what will grow. Gardening always invites a kind of faith: placing something tiny in the soil and trusting that, with time and care, it will become something fruitful.

As our gardens begin to take shape in June, we're reminded that much of the most important growth happens below the surface. That's true not only in the soil, but in our spirits and in the life of the church. Summer may feel quieter here at Westminster, but I

pray it can also be a time of deep nourishment, rooting, and renewal.

How might you want to grow this summer? And how might you seek that growth in community with others who are planting, wondering, and watching alongside you?

I look forward to continuing in worship and community with you this season. On June 8, we'll celebrate Pentecost in worship, when the Holy Spirit renews and energizes us for the journey ahead. That afternoon at 4pm, the Spirit will really burst through the doors as we gather for the joyful conclusion of our organ series. Come and be filled: by music, by Spirit, and by the gift of being together.

Later in the month, we'll shift into our summer rhythm more fully. Beginning June 22, our Sunday worship time will move one hour earlier, to 10am, for the remainder of the summer. Wherever this season takes you, I hope you'll find space for rest, reflection, and the quiet trust that something sacred is always taking root.

Continuing to Support our Refugee Neighbors

Once again this year, Westminster will support refugee families in our community through a summer-holiday donation drive running from Memorial Day through the 4th of July.

These are tough times for local refugees, who are working hard to integrate into American life and to build self-sustainability and independence. Washtenaw Refugee Welcome, a local nonprofit, reports that approximately 1,500 refugees reached Michigan in the last few months of 2024. However, the governmental funding freeze

and resettlement ban implemented in January of this year have left these families without the crucial support needed to help set up their new lives here.

Yet local agencies, such as Washtenaw Refugee Welcome and Jewish Family Services of Washtenaw County (JFS), are working hard to fill the void. Westminster is partnering with JFS who will distribute gifts and donations made through our refugee donation drive to local refugees in need. Monetary gifts may be made on the Westminster website, or checks payable to Westminster Presbyterian Church may be given to Dave Gross, Bookkeeper. Gift card donations should also be delivered directly to Dave Gross. Needed donation items include:

- 1. Personal care items: deodorant, razors, shampoo, conditioner, soap bars, body lotion
- 2. Baby items: diapers and wipes, baby shampoo, lotion and body wash
- 3. Cleaning supplies: Lysol all-purpose cleaner, dish soap, dish sponges, Clorox toilet bowl cleaner, laundry detergent
- 4. **Gift cards:** Meijer and Kroger, \$25, \$50, \$75, \$100 or Visa gift cards (please deliver gift cards directly to Dave Gross, Bookkeeper)

Donation bins are located in the hallway leading to Fellowship Hall and in the Narthex. Let's work together to support our refugee neighbors!

Church Buddies Keep At-Home Members Connected

A new deacon outreach program aims to pair each Westminster at-home member with a church buddy who already has an established, ongoing relationship with them. The buddy then serves as a liaison with the at-home member's deacon. At-home members are those who are no longer able to attend worship in person.

We are already seeing benefits. Church buddies have accompanied deacons on several visits to at-home members to introduce them and make new connections. Because they already stay in touch with at-home members, the church buddies are able to let deacons know when it would be helpful to reach out.

Deacons change every 1 to 3 years, but the church buddy/liaison provides a more permanent, personal connection. This new program also offers support to deacons, who are now responsible for connecting with more church members—and more at-home members—than in previous years.

Psalm 27:14 – "Wait for the Lord; be strong and take heart and wait for the Lord."

Proverbs 3:5–6 – "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways submit to him, and he will make your paths straight.

1 Peter 5:7 - "Cast all your anxiety on him because he cares for you."

Joshua 1:9 – "Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged, for the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go."

Psalm 56:3 - "When I am afraid, I put my trust in you."

Romans 8:28 – "And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose."
