

Practicing Generosity

"How does God's love abide in anyone who has the world's goods and sees a brother or sister in need and yet refuses help? Little children, let us love not in word or speech but in deed and truth."

(1 John 3:17-18)

This fall we've begun rebuilding our faith formation program for children and youth, with a few more young members joining our community. In October, we gathered for the first time using a PC(USA) curriculum called Follow Me: Biblical Practices for Faithful Living. The Follow Me series focuses not just on teaching Bible stories, but on nurturing practices that help us live our faith every day. We're starting with the theme "Practice Generosity," exploring how generosity is rooted in justice and connected to caring for our neighbors' minds, bodies, spirits, and lives in community, just as Jesus modeled.

Our children and youth already embody this kind of generosity beautifully. I see them creating art for one another, noticing and tending to the needs of friends, sharing their time and attention to celebrate others, and raising their voices for issues that matter in their schools, teams, and communities. It's rewarding to connect what they're already doing with the stories and wisdom of our faith.



Our youngest members also learn generosity by watching the adults around them. They see how you step up to help one another, take time to learn about each other's passions, and give of your time, resources, wisdom, and love in open-hearted ways. These shared practices form the fabric of our community, weaving together the everyday and the sacred.

There are many situations in the world right now where it's easy to feel powerless, to hold our fear and despair apart from any reasonable action or concrete hope. Yet when we choose generosity, we model another way. Each act of care, each moment of listening, each gift freely offered is a quiet resistance to hopelessness. In giving to one another, we affirm that abundance still exists, that gratitude and compassion can still take root. As we all practice generosity together, we learn that faith is not only what we believe, but how we live with open hands in a fearful world. I felt that hope when gathering with the middle/high school group in October, and I look forward to it again on November 9th, the next time we meet.

Finally, a small pitch: This fall we are piloting a oncearmonth gathering for elementary, middle, and high school students, and it's exciting! However, we'd love to offer children's faith formation more often than oncearmonth in the spring. If you'd be interested in joining in as a teacher or assistant, I would love to talk with you! This curriculum is easy to follow, our children and youth are such kind, curious, and interesting people. I am confident you would get more out of it than you put into it! Let me know if you would like to learn more!


We look forward to welcoming all of you to Thanksgiving Eve and sharing a special loaf of bread for this holiday.

On Sunday, November 9, Westminster will host "Getting Your Ducks in a Row", a Lunch & Learn workshop after worship for people of all ages. Whether you are planning for yourself, walking alongside aging parents, or simply hoping to be better prepared, this gathering will offer tools and conversation to help you think ahead with confidence and peace.

We will explore spiritual, financial, and practical dimensions of end-of-life planning. Gordon Beeman will share guidance on financial and estate planning. Stacey Frisinger, of Choice Senior Home Care, will discuss options for various levels of supportive care as one's needs change. Pastor Hannah will lead a conversation about memorial planning and spiritual care.
